Call to Order

Moore Award

The Moore Awards for the Best Paper on Clinico-Pathological Correlation was awarded, to **Karra Muller** for *Alzheimer Neuropathological Changes in Brains from Subjects with Diabetes Mellitus: A Clinicopathological Study.* Two honorable mentions were awarded, one to **Katherine Lindstrom** for *IgG4-Related Pachymeningitis:*

Five Additional Cases of a Recently Described Entity, and the other to **Karen Lewis** for Neurites Containing C-Terminally Truncated α -Synuclein in Alzheimer's Disease without Conventional Lewy Body Pathology.

Lucien J. Rubinstein Award

The Lucien J. Rubinstein Award for the Best Paper on Neuro-oncology was presented to **Sriram Venneti** for *MicroRNA-9 and MicroRNA-200a Differentiate CNS Hemangioblastomas from CNS Metastatic Clear Cell Renal Cell Carcinomas.* Two honorable mentions were awarded, one to **Jeremy Deisch** for *Expression of SALL4 and LIN28 by Malignant Rhabdoid Tumors of the Central Nervous System,* and the other to **Matija Snuderl** for *Inhibition of Placental Growth Factor (PIGF) Leads to Regression of Medulloblastoma.*

Weil Award

The Weil Award for the Best Paper on Experimental Neuropathology was awarded to **Shakti Ramkissoon** for *Directed Pten Loss in Olig2+ Stem Cells Results in Massive Myelination and Neurodegeneration in the Absence of Neoplasia.* Two honorable mentions were awarded, one to **Homa Adle-Biassette** for *Moderate Intermittent Hypoxia Protects Neurodevelopment in Newborn Mice,* and the other to **Gang Xu** for *The Development of GABAergic Neurons in the Human Cerebral Cortex.*

Diagnositic Slide Session Report - Tony Yachnis, MD

A total of 21 submissions were received for consideration of which the final 12 were chosen. Eight out of the 12 cases will be presented by trainees this year. Cases were obtained from all areas of Neuropathology. A virtual DSS archive of all the cases back to 2000 is now available on the website. The cases and diagnosis are posted back to 1959. Dr. Yachnis thanked Dr. Sharer and Dr. E. Tessa Hedley-Whyte for being great mentors and Dr. Mark Cohen for taking on the roll of manager and for all of his help.

Program Committee Report – Amyn M. Rojiani, MD, PhD

Arrangements were made with Sierra Bay Technology Group for an online submission system. We exceeded the number of abstract submissions from last year by 3 with 160 submissions this year. The largest group is tumor, with neurodegenerative diseases, second. New for this year were 3 submissions in the trauma category. 64 abstracts were placed into platform presentations and the remaining as posters. All abstracts were reviewed by at least 2 members of the committee who ranked them as whether they thought they would be good for a platform vs. poster. There were 23 applicants for trainee travel awards, of which 6 were chosen. The winners are Mark Vitucci, Shakti Ramkissoon, Matija Snuderl, Gang Xu, Jeremy Deisch, and Julia Kofler.

Editor-in-Chief, J. Neuropathol Exp Neurol – Raymond A. Sobel, MD

Dr. Sobel acknowledged the assistant editors, Eileen Healey and Mike Hart along with the Editorial Board.

An Autobiography of Dr. Hirano will appear in the June issue.

Lippincott (LWW) has done a lot of on line advertisement and promoting of the journal they also launched a new website which has collections of articles grouped by topic. Print subscriptions are down and online subscriptions have increased. The Impact factor is 5.1. 27% of articles have a first author from the USA and the remaining 73% are non-USA first authors. There were 335 submissions with 111 accepted which is approximately a 30% acceptance rate.

In negotiations with LWW to renew the contract and two plans have been put forth. The Executive Committee has decided to follow plan B.

Plan A: Continue the current contract where \$120.00 of the money collected from each member goes to LWW (Active - \$185.00 collected, \$120.00 LWW and \$65.00 to AANP).

Plan B: Each member receives online subscription only to the journal with the option to receive the print edition of JNEN for an additional \$50.00 (Active - \$185.00 collected, \$70 to LWW and \$115.00 to AANP). With a print edition the cost is \$235.00 with LWW collecting \$120.00 and AANP \$115.00 for active members. Senior members will receive online subscription only with no dues collected.

We are currently evaluating the continued engagement of AOE Consulting for assistance in future meeting planning, including guidance in identifying practice gaps through a needs assessment process, developing appropriate learning objectives and educational programs designed to address those practice gaps, and then measuring changes in learner competence.

Update of Prion Surveillance Center - Mark Cohen, MD

Dr. Cohen gave a brief update of the Surveillance Center. The number of potential cases has increased, people are doing a good job of recognizing cases. A new sporadic disease of the prion protein that looks like frontal lobe demntia has been termed Protease Sensitive Prionopathy.
