The 80th Annual Meeting of the American Association of Neuropathologists will be held June 24-27, 2004, at the Renaissance Cleveland Hotel in Cleveland Ohio.

Posters will be on display all day Friday and Saturday in the Exhibit hall. Posters should be up by 8:00 am Friday and be removed by 5:30 pm Saturday. Poster presenters are asked to be present at their poster at the designated time to facilitate discussion with other interested attendees.

REGISTRATION

You may register online with a credit card in a secure environment at www.aanp-jnen.com. You also may return the registration form, available on the website in pdf format by mail or fax. AANP accepts payment by all major credit cards, including VISA, MasterCard, American Express and Discover. Registration fees are \$150.00 for members, \$ 200.00 for nonmembers and \$80.00 for trainees, as the preregistration date has passed and a 25.00 processing fee has been added. The registration fee is required for admittance to all scientific sessions Friday and Saturday, for the Friday evening reception and Saturday evening Diagnostic Slide Session and the Sunday morning Presidential Symposium. Additionally admittance to the special course on Thursday 24 June requires an additional \$125.00 fee. The registration fee includes one ticket to the Friday evening Annual Reception. Additional tickets may be purchased at \$20.00 each for members/faculty and \$10.00 for students/residents/fellows.

NOTES TO PRESENTERS

All PowerPoint presentations will be transferred onto a common show computer prior to the start time of each session. Presentations should be brought on either a CD-ROM or Zip disc. Our audiovisual staff will provide computers loaded with MS Office XP that will run from the podium. Presenters are asked to take their disc to the room in which they will present (Grand Ballroom A or B) during the designated times to load your talk. You write a letter at the beginning of December 2004. Your request will not be reviewed until June 2005 therefore you must pay your 2005 dues as your status change will not take place until the following January (2006). We suggest that you request the status change prior to your actual retirement date. As a senior member you retain full membership benefits without paying annual dues. However, if you wish to continue receiving the journal there is a \$120.00 charge to cover production costs
